Welcome to the La Frontera/The Border Conference! This Chapman University conference is the culmination of the series of events, art exhibits, and courses focused on La Frontera. Borders divide people, laws, and environments; across them flow people, legal and illegal goods, money, and more. During Fall 2019, Chapman University embarked on a campus-wide interrogation of border issues, particularly those surrounding the U.S.-Mexico border. Throughout the semester students and community joined a book club, toured the four art installations, and attended lectures with leading experts. Drawing from the humanities, social sciences, journalism, law, and visual and performing arts, courses have been examining borders through interdisciplinary perspectives. Seventeen public events have encouraged the campus and wider community to examine the controversial issues around borders.

From November 14-16 Chapman University welcomes leading scholars, artists, and journalists with expertise in border issues to campus for public and free panels, lectures, and engagement with memory and art. The Thursday keynote presentation features Francisco Cantú, former border patrol agent whose memoir, A Line Becomes a River: Dispatches from the Border, won the 2018 Los Angeles Times Book Award. The conference also offers space for student presentations of their research and creative activity on this topic. By engaging in multidisciplinary examination of this topic, we hope our community will come away better informed and prepared to be engaged global citizens.

Providing opportunities that inform and encourage our community to wrestle with the tough issues of today is part of the mission of Chapman University. La Frontera has provided our community with many resources and multiple perspectives to encourage more knowledgeable thinking about the U.S.-Mexico border. Additionally, Chapman has been working toward greater diversity and true inclusivity in its student body, faculty, and staff; La Frontera builds from the work of the "Chapman Diversity Project," by showcasing in Leatherby Library (and later the Rinker Health Science Campus) the recent acquisitions of art by a diverse array of artists' work on borders in the Escalette Permanent Collection. Further perspectives have been added by the show at the Guggenheim Gallery and the BorderClick exhibit in Argyros Forum. You are encouraged to take a box lunch and explore these exhibits during lunch on Friday. We encourage our community to continue learning from many ways of knowing about border issues—from visual art to poetry, from journalism to the law, and from social science to film. Through informed & active citizenry we can make a difference in the challenging issues of our time!
